We remember Mary to know that faith and strength can come from the most unexpected places.


On Christmas Eve, our candlelight service is at 7PM.

White Gift Service-Sunday, December 22

The story of White Gift Sunday began in 1903, in Painesville, Ohio, where a woman was troubled by her children arguing over the value of different gifts. She suggested that they, together with other children of the Sunday school who were bringing gifts to church for those in need, should wrap the gifts in white paper. The uniformity of decoration would obscure the gifts' value. The idea allowed everyone to participate in the joy of giving without regard to economic status. However, we are asking that you do not wrap your gifts. First, it creates waste and second, more work for those sorting these gifts.

Our White Gifts are given to the Downtown Mission. We've asked what would be most useful and protein was the answer. Cans of tuna, ham, turkey, beef or other meats would be welcome. White Gifts are given as an act of worship while the whole community is present. Please leave these items unwrapped.

The ideas behind the origin of the White Gifts tradition resonate for us today. Poverty may be obvious to the attentive observer, but there are many communities in which poverty goes unseen. Our congregation continues to play a vital role not only in making someone's Christmas with simple gifts, but also in declaring that unseen needs are not forgotten. This is the joy that

Mary expresses in the Magnificat—that God sees the needs of the people and desires us to rectify injustice, reconcile relationships, and mend the broken.

UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA ANNIVERSARY ANECDOTES

The year 2025 will be an especially significant time in the history of the United Church of Canada. One hundred years ago, on June 10, 1925, three protestant denominations united to form the United Church of Canada. The United Church was founded in 1925 as an amalgamation of the Union of Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational churches. The new United Church of Canada was inaugurated at a large worship service at Toronto's Mutual Street Arena on June 10, 1925. Participants were handed a 38-page order of service containing the full text of the liturgy, prayers, hymns, and music. Hymns from all three churches were sung: "All people that on earth do dwell" from the Scottish Presbyterian psalm tradition; the Methodist favourite "O for a thousand tongues to sing" by Charles Wesley; the Congregationalist "O God of Bethel"; and "When I survey the wondrous cross" by the British Nonconformist, Isaac Watts.

In recognition of this historic occasion, we will include these ANNIVERSARY ANECDOTES in each monthly issue of the Emmanuel United Church newsletter until June 8, 2025, when Emmanuel will celebrate the 100th anniversary of the United Church of Canada.
